Your Pet's Reaction Will Guide the Therapy

Pets will have small reactions during therapy, as simple as looking back for a change in breathing, which helps the therapist identify the area(s) where the treatment is most needed.

Not all shockwave therapies are the same. PiezoWave^{2T} VET is designed to reach the source of the pain, not just the surface. That's why results last.

What to Expect

Each treatment takes 3-10 minutes per area.

- Water-soluble gel is applied to the treatment area; clipping is rarely needed.
- Most pets need 3-4 treatments for optimal results, with improvement building over sessions.
- Mild post-treatment soreness is possible and can be managed by adjusting future doses.
- Shockwave usually provides 72 hours of pain relief after each session. Restrict activity during this window to protect the treated area.
